

Progressions for Supporting ELLs Through Facilitation

The WIDA^{TM1} framework categorizes English Language Learners (ELLs) into different proficiency levels, ranging from Level 1 (Entering) to Level 6 (Reaching) based on their English language proficiency test. Students will have different linguistic needs based on their proficiency level, so having an abbreviated understanding of the levels will be beneficial.

At IDE Corp., we have developed the 7 Essential Elements for ELL Support to support educators working with ELLs. Though most language instruction will come from an English as a Second Language (ESL) teacher, it is still important that all teachers consider how they can support this element in their classroom. This document provides ideas on how educators can differentiate their *Facilitation* for ELLs at different proficiency levels.

Level 1: Entering ELLs have limited or no proficiency in English.	Level 2: Emerging ELLs understand and use basic communication.	Level 3: Developing ELLs are making progress in understanding and producing English.	Level 4: Expanding ELLs are capable of using more complex language structures.
